Mission Plan: A 2- day drill encompassing didactic instruction in Bomb/Blast injury characteristics, Triage, Incident Command [ICS], Litter transport skills, Portable hospital construction, Landing Zone operations on the first day. On the second day a simulated event will require a multi agency joint military/civilian response to aid local authorities in dealing with a multi-casualty event. %0 victims of a bomb/blast require field assessment, triage and transport to awaiting simulated hospital facilities for treatment. NIMS ICS in the EOC will coordinate the multi-agency response.

Training Plan:

To present a field training drill to accomplish multiple agency training initiatives.

To teach medical management skills for disaster response to bomb blast injuries. [Blast Injury. Triage, Litter Transport, LZ Ops, Field stabilization] To meet and work with local and state agency assets in solving disaster scenario problems.

To establish response agency relationships for future response capabilities, if needed.

The Event: Bomb Blast in a vehicle at summer festival at CGTC





Police establish perimeters, Fire reponds to site, EMS & Triage teams transport victims to the casualty collection area, then on to the regional hospitals- Perry and Houston.

Training Assessment: The Medical Association of Georgia Medical Reserve Corps [MAGMRC - 20 medical professionals on site] was excited to work with the 116th MDG GAANG [40 NG staff on site] and the many other agencies [Trinity School of Medicine, Central Georgia Technical College, Warner Robins Police and Fire Services, Global Medical Response Air Ambulance, Houston Co Sheriff's Dept Flight Operations] involved in the multi-agency response training. By the MAGMRC assessments there were 272 persons and 4 canines involved in the training at the height of the drill.

The impact of this training has been discussed as "highly effective and realistic in representing the chaos that exists in typical disaster response - issues of communication obstacles, security concerns, and coordination of multi agency groups that often have not had the opportunity to train together." The opportunity to meet and coordinate a response to the "Event" with response personnel from military and civilian authorities was

a principal accomplishment of this drill. Each agency not only tested their internal response skills but also their adaptability to work with other response agencies in a unified goal. The MAGMRC physicians and NHG resident physicians were involved in instructor roles teaching incident command principles, triage, and landing zone skills medical students and allied health students. The military physicians and medical personnel were also involved in teaching disaster triage principles, litter management skills and medical treatment skills. The 116th MDG GAANG was integrally involved in disaster preparation skills training, field hospital construction and operation, and medical care delivery to victims. Moulage victims made the scenario and injuries more realistic. Police, Fire, and Aviation assets also provided realism to the event.



Nearly 50 medical personnel with the 116th Medical Group, Detachment 1, Georgia Air
National Guard, trained with civilian medical professionals and local authorities to respond to a mass casualty scenario in Warner Robins, Georgia, June 11 and 12.

The **Big Blast Theory** exercise, initiated by the Medical Association of Georgia's Medical Reserve Corps (MAG MRC) and hosted at Central Georgia Technical College in Warner Robins, pulled 275 participants from around Georgia together for two days, honing their individual skills and learning to operate together.

"Readiness is critical to us," said Lt. Col. James Small, 116th MDG, Det 1 commander. "You never know when a disaster could happen." According to Small, in domestic operations such as disaster response, military personnel typically fall under the guidance of a civilian response team. There are pieces of the operation that can only be trained on with civilian cooperation, such as patient transportation to medical facilities.

This event aimed to integrate various state response agencies, so the medical director of MAG/MRC made contact with the Georgia National Guard's homeland response force, looking for interest.

"The people charged with providing protection to the community are in multiple agencies," said Dr. John Harvey, MAG MRC's medical director and the master mind behind the exercise. "Coming together seamlessly doesn't occur without training." Harvey was part of the medical response for a number of emergency incidents, to include the 1996 Centennial Olympic Park bombing and Hurricane Katrina. Harvey's objectives for the exercise included improved command and control during disaster responses and training in simulated, but realistic conditions, according to Harvey. "We put together practical challenges that stress the skills utilized in disasters," he said.

For this exercise, that looked like using moulage on volunteers to simulate injuries, dramatic role play, sirens, sounds of explosions, and smoke. Participants operated in the rain and the heat, too.

"The irony is we train for an event we hope never happens," Small said. "But as it goes, if you fail to plan, you plan to fail"

Networking was a very important aspect of the exercise, according to Dr. Frances Purcell, dean of the Trinity School of Medicine and lead planner for the exercise. "We all know the time to exchange business cards is not in the midst of the chaos," Purcell said. "These exercises better prepare us to respond, because we're going to be thrown into the chaos together." The MAG MRC planning committee is looking to do future iterations of this exercise, according to Purcell.

Besides the 116th MDG, Det 1, participants included the Georgia State Patrol, Georgia Bureau of Investigation, Warner Robins Police Department, several local fire departments, and other local medical response entities.

"The exercise was a win-win for us," Small said. "I think the participation among the participants was fantastic. Everyone was willing to compromise and work together to make this successful to achieve the training goals of each entity, as well as showcase their readiness capabilities."
